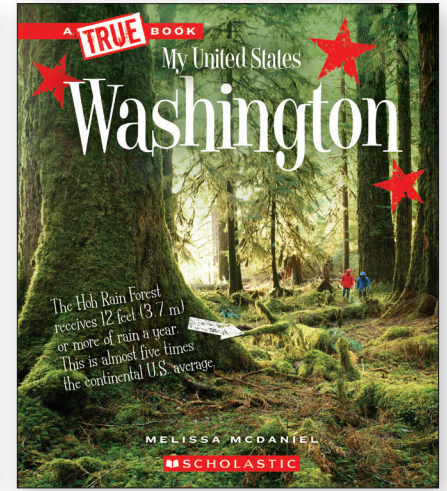
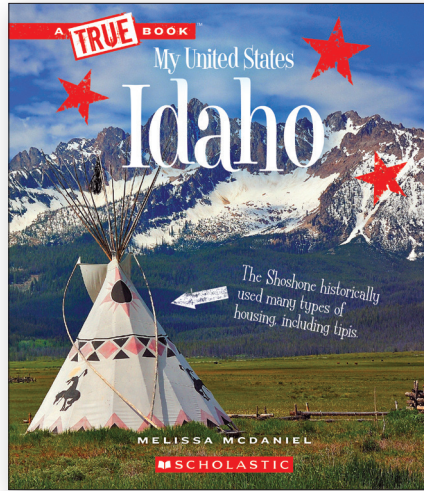

Geography

The Pacific Coast forms Oregon's western border. To the north is Washington State. The mighty Columbia River forms most of the border between these two states. One of the largest rivers in the country, the Columbia flows 1,243 miles (2,000 kilometers) from Canada into the Pacific Ocean. Idaho lies to Oregon's east, while California and Nevada are to the south.

This map shows where the higher (red) and lower (green) areas are in Oregon.

Mount Hood

With a height of 11,239 feet (3,426 m), the summit of Mount Hood is the highest point in Oregon. This volcano was originally named *Mt. Hood* by the Multnomah people, who have lived in the area for hundreds of years. Its snowy slopes make it a popular destination in northwestern Oregon for skiers and snowboarders. Mount Hood is home to the only ski resort in the country where people can ski year-round. Climbers and hikers also enjoy the challenge of trying to reach the mountain's snowy highest points.
